Heritage Weekend



The 64th Annual Heritage Weekend will be held September 22-24, 2017. Several Heritage Weekend events will occur at our church on Saturday, September 23.

- The church will be open for tours from 10:00 am until 5 pm.
- The Boy Scouts will be selling food at the pavilion.
- The Shenandoah Valley Minstrels will play historical music from noon until 3pm on the front lawn.

The Sons of Confederate Veterans, Camp 582, McNeill's Rangers will have an authentic encampment on the lawn of the church.

“West Virginia History Alive!”, sponsored by the West Virginia Humanities Council, will present a historic reenactment of Harriet Tubman in the Chapel at 2:00 pm. Ilene Evans portrays the famous abolitionist Harriet Tubman, nicknamed the Moses of her people. Tubman was born into slavery in Maryland, in the 1820s. With the aid of the secret network of abolitionists called the Underground Railroad, she escaped in 1849 and then became a “conductor” herself. She was the most famous leader of the network, venturing repeatedly into the South to aid slaves escaping to free states or to Canada. During the Civil War, she served as a spy, nurse, scout, and guide for Union troops.

On Sunday, September 24, an old time special worship service will be conducted at 11:00am at the town church. There will be no service at either chapel.

At 6pm the annual hymn sing will be held at the Fort Pleasant Meeting House in Old Fields.

After the opening each night, the children were divided into crews (small groups) that rotated to each of 5 stations. The crew leaders were amazing. 

Highlights of Session Meeting August 20, 2017

It was reported that the Sacrament of Holy Communion was celebrated at all three worship locations on August 6, 2017. Also, the joint worship service celebrating the Oak Dale Homecoming was held earlier during the day at regular worship time.

The Boy Scouts were approved to hold a food sale at the Town Church during Heritage Weekend.

Several joys and concerns were discussed. It was noted that Rev. Bruce Macbeth had a heart procedure done recently and was doing well. Other concerns included: the Jeff Hartman family, Dwane Barr, Elizabeth Barr, and Nellie Leatherman.

The Pastor Nominating Committee reported that three Skype interviews had been held and that one of the three had come to Moorefield for an in-person interview. The other two had withdrawn their names from consideration. A meeting of the PNC was being held on August 22.

The Nominating Committee is working to fill the slate of nominees for church offices for 2018. Tentatively, a congregational meeting will be held on September 17 to receive the Nominating Committee report and vote on the officers.

The revised Active Membership list presented by the Growth and Communications committee was approved. Also, the Committee reported that the Church website is being updated. Since Linda Johnston is retiring at the end of the year as editor of the church newsletter, the church secretary, Susan Kelleher, has indicated a willingness to serve in that capacity. The Committee will also be looking at membership lists to determine the young people who might be eligible for a confirmation class. The suggestion/comment boxes at all three worship locations are being monitored. Several suggestions were discussed and the Session will deal with those as well as several others that were made.

Roof repair or replacement over the stage in the Fellowship Hall was discussed. It appears as if the replacement will need to be done and the Property Committee will undertake the work. A Manse Use Policy was presented, discussed and held over until the September meeting for final approval. A work evening at the Town Church will be held on September 19 in conjunction with a Boy Scout meeting.

Lucy West was appointed Elder Commissioner for the next Presbytery meeting on August 26.

The Session approved the nomination of Donald Baker to apply to attend the General Assembly meeting to be held in St. Louis, MO in June, 2018.

The next stated meeting of the Session will be September 17, 2017.




The Inauguration

GROW IN Grace

Make this craft as a reminder to continue growing in God's amazing grace.



What you need:

- An adult to help
- Newspaper
- Acrylic paints
- Paper plate
- Paintbrush
- Small terra cotta pot and plate
- Cup of water
- Permanent black marker
- Potting soil
- Small "indoors" plant or packet of seeds

What you do:

1. Cover your work area with newspaper and squeeze paint onto the paper plate.
2. Paint designs on the pot and plate, cleaning your brush in the water when changing colors. Let dry.
3. With the black marker, write "Growing in God's Grace" along the top ridge of the pot.
4. Pour in a small amount of soil. Place your plant in the pot and surround it with more soil. (If planting seeds, follow packet instructions.)
5. Water your plant. Check it daily and keep the soil moist.
6. Enjoy watching your plant grow!
